Report on the progress made in attaining the goals of the wellness policy (REQUIRED):

- 1. Ensure that the School Wellness Policy directs health and nutrition activities in the school.
- Staff have been educated on the contents of the School Wellness Policy through inservice training. Staff have made efforts to ensure that student participate in the lunch program and offer a large variety of physical health activities. The school will enhance the efforts to have student and parent input on the Wellness Committee.
- 2. Continue to assess ways to improve and enhance curriculum for integration of nutrition education into classroom learning. The teachers have continued to develop creative ways to incorporate nutrition into the science and health curriculum to help students understand and take more personal responsibility for their health. Physical education classes are tailored to address students' individual skills and interests in addition to the traditional group physical activities.
- 3.To enhance the efforts to incorporate Farm to School activities into the curriculum. To ensure that there is visual messages regarding nutrition and health in the school and communicated to parents. These goals will be a focus of the Wellness Committee in the upcoming year. Ideas will be generated to partner with local farms and gardens.
- 4. To continue provide opportunities for students' to incorporate physical/wellness activities into their daily life. The Wellness Committee will research community organizations in the students local neighborhoods for physical and social activities and communicate this information to the parents.
- 5. To increase participation in menu planning and nutrition education with students and parents. Student feedback is utilized in making adjustments to the menus on an on-going basis. The FSMC is very responsive to student suggestions. The FSMC will provide nutrition information on the meals that will be made available to students, faculty and parents. A process will be established to get parent input on menu planning for the upcoming school year.
- 6. To ensure that all required nutrition guidelines and implemented in the school. The faculty and students have received informational materials on Smart Snacks in School, to teach them how to determine if snacks meet guidelines and how they are an important part of a healthy diet. The Wellness Committee will generate nonfood ideas for rewards and incentives. These ideas will be communicated to parents for incorporation at home.
